

INTERMEDIATE ICS FOR EXPANDING INCIDENTS









Why is ICS needed?

The Incident Command System (ICS) provides a flexible, yet standardized core mechanism for coordinated and collaborative incident management, whether for incidents where additional resources are required or are provided from different organizations within a single jurisdiction or outside the jurisdiction, or for complex incidents with national implications.

What is ICS?

ICS is the acronym for Incident Command System. ICS is a fundamental form of management established in a standard format, with the purpose of enabling incident managers to identify the key concerns associated with the incident—often under urgent conditions—without sacrificing attention to any component of the command system.

EOC OPERATIONS

For larger events responders receive a briefing prior to going to their work assignments. This consists of objectives, contact information, radio protocol and more.
