

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KNOWING THE DIFFERENCE



#### WINTER STORM WATCH

A Winter Storm Watch alerts the public to the possibility of a blizzard, heavy snow, heavy freezing rain, or heavy sleet. A Winter Storm Watch is usually issued 36 to 48 hours in advance.



#### WINTER STORM WARNING

A Winter Storm Warning is issued when 3" of heavy snow or sleet is expected within a 12 hour period or when 4" of heavy snow or sleet is expected within a 24 hour period. Winter Storm Warnings are usually issued 12 to 24 hours in advance.



#### WINTER WEATHER ADVISORY

A Winter Weather Advisory is issued when 1" of snow or sleet or a trace to 1/4" of ice is expected within a 12 hour period. A Winter Weather Advisory is generally issued 12 to 24 hours in advance.



#### **ICE STORM WARNING**

An Ice Storm Warning is issued when 1/4" of ice or more is expected in the area.



#### WIND CHILL WARNING

A Wind Chill Warning is issued when wind chill temperatures are expected to drop to -15°F or less



#### WIND CHILL ADVISORY

A Wind Chill Advisory is issued when wind chill temperatures are expected to drop between 0°F to -15°F
